#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

#### **FOX HUNTING**

Taken from a newspaper article in the Weston Mercury & Somersetshire Herald on September 22, 1877 by John Hugh Wadham Smith-Pigott where he describes being Master of the Woodspring Harriers.

They hunted throughout the district from Brockley to Weston-super-Mare. Then he goes onto say he founded the Woodspring Hunt himself 37 years ago, and the Bowling Green, Brockley and Ashcombe Lodge near Weston held the kennels where they kept 16 to 20 couple of fox hounds [22 in dogs]. He also writes the stables at Brockley Hall and at The Grove, Weston-super-Mare were quite studded with, pads, masks and brushes. They often met at Woodspring Priory and sometimes ran a fox to earth at the very point of St Thomas's Head.

Before the usual spring rush, paint fences and sheds and get other general maintenance jobs done. If plants are trained onto fences to be painted make certain that the paint you use is plant safe.

Construct a cold frame to get early crops going

#### **ON OUR FARMS**

Late winter is always an exciting time for those involved in farming. If you have sheep, lambing is due to start, if you keep cattle, you are looking forward to the end of winter and letting the animals out to graze and if you are an arable farmer the time has come to start field operations either planting new crops or feeding the ones in the ground. Farming has always been about producing food but now farmers are being encouraged to think about other things too. Quite rightly, environmental concerns have become the talking point in many conversations. So, what is being discussed? Solar panels and wind generation is high on many agendas. Both provide clean, sustainable energy but they take up land that would otherwise be used to produce food. We are being encouraged to consider digging ponds and planting woodland. These are both admirable objectives and many farmers have already done this in parts of their farm which doesn't produce food effectively. The odd corners of fields too wet to grow even grass had ponds dug and trees planted many years ago. Both provide fantastic habitat, sequester carbon and don't impact of efficient food production. There is a move to 'rewild' large areas of land. Rewilding means little food production in these areas but a return to a wild environment. An admirable objective but it does need managing to create an environment that creates the best environment. There is a compromise. Regenerative farming and conservation grazing is rising up many farmers' agendas. Each is a more holistic manner of management. It doesn't stop farmers from producing food and it doesn't let large tracts of land revert to wild scrub with little environmental value. Some might say that's how it was done in the old days. So it might be, but with the accusations levelled against farmers for many environmental woes suffered in the last fifty or so years it might be common ground that we can use to satisfy everyone's aspirations. It's exciting times for British farmers with many changes on the horizon. What we do need to do though, is make sure we continue to produce good wholesome food as locally as possible and not export our environmental issues to other parts of the world yet to be impacted by modern farming techniques. Farms around Cleve in 2022 might not look very different from years gone by but rest assured, there is plenty of thinking going on and there will be change.

#### **TIPS FROM CLEEVE NURSERY**

Could your garden look better? This is the month when it is stripped to the basic skeleton by winter and when you can assess whether an evergreen shrub, conifer or tree or perhaps an archway, pergola or statue would improve things.

Trim lawn edges with a sharp edging iron. Insert plastic or metal edging strips as support. It's amazing what a difference neat lawn edges makes to the look of a garden! Start to cut the lawn as required on dry mild days.

Don't forget to buy **seed potatoes** and set them up to shoot ['chitting']. Early varieties like '**Rocket**' will benefit but later varieties will yield better too if encouraged into growth before planting out. If you have room for only one variety, grow '**Charlotte**'.

#### TIP FROM CLEEVE NURSERY

Repot your houseplants, if they need it, into one pot size larger using good multipurpose compost [such as our own]. Use moss poles to support taller plants. Prune conservatory plants back and reshape them.

#### **CLEEVE PARISH COUNCIL UPDATE**

**Council Meetings**: Meetings are now held face to face on the 2nd Tuesday of each month (except August and December when no meetings are held).

All meetings will be held in Cleeve Village Hall in accordance with any Covid-19 regulations current at that time.

**Budget and Precept for Cleeve for year 2022/23**: At our January Parish Council meeting on 11 January the Council Budget for the financial year 2022/23 was discussed and reviewed.

Due to Covid the last couple of years have been unprecedented and much planned expenditure has not taken place. This being the case we have decided that, as an exceptional matter, this year we will not be seeking an increase in our Precept from North Somerset.

This only impacts on the part of overall Council Tax directly relating to Cleeve and it is, of course, probable that overall Council Tax in North Somerset will increase. We did however want to avoid adding to the local burden at this difficult time.

**CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) Monies:** The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a new way of collecting financial contributions from developments towards the provision of infrastructure required to support growth in North Somerset. It has been in place since January 2018 and North Somerset Council CIL charges are based on a tariff of rates that have been set through public consultation and examination by the Planning Inspectorate.

Town and Parish Councils in North Somerset will receive a proportion of the CIL funds collected from developments in their Town or Parish.

In Cleeve we have received a payment relating to the re-development of the former Lord Nelson site.

The CIL Regulations state that a Town/Parish Council must use CIL receipts passed to it in accordance with Regulation 59A or 59B to support the development of the local council's area, or any part of that area, by funding:

(a) the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or

(b) anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

Cleeve Parish Council are consulting the community on any ideas they may have for projects. The ideas must be

a) For the benefit of the community.

b) No major infrastructure projects.

c) Projects up to a value of £5,000.

We will also publish this request on our Facebook page and be available to discuss at parish "surgeries" when these re-commence. We will also review any issues which may arise once the new development is operational in Spring 2022. A Strategy for Traffic in Cleeve: After strong representations by ourselves and our District Councillor, Steve Hogg, we have now had confirmation from Highways at North Somerset Council that the Cleeve scheme is still on their schedule. It should now be implemented in the 2022/2023 financial year.

It seems that the issues around parking are improving but it would be helpful if, in the first instance, that any illegal parking is reported to North Somerset via https://forms.n-somerset.gov.uk/ad/form/parkingillegally#/1

It is important to remember that, under the Road Traffic Act 1991, parking was decriminalised and civil enforcement of car parking regulations, is now carried out by civil enforcement officers operating on behalf of North Somerset Council rather than by the Police.

As we discussed at our November meeting our Annual Parish Meeting this year will look at formulating a strategy to cover the whole of Cleeve and review speed limit options, parking, traffic calming and any other suggestions which are put forward.

Provisionally this meeting will be held in the Village Hall on Tuesday 26th April 2022. Full details will be provided nearer the time but it is intended to include our District Councillor, Steve Hogg, plus representatives of North Somerset Council and the Police. **Air Quality Monitoring:** In liaison with North Somerset Council we have arranged to undertake Air Quality Monitoring particularly on the A370 in the area around the Lord Nelson/Tout's development. This is now in place and will give us a reference point ahead of the site being operational.

**Bristol Airport**: Bristol Airport Public Inquiry has now concluded and the date for announcement of the decision has not yet been set but is expected before the end of January 2022.

This is likely to be a lengthy process to investigate viability, but we would be like to hear from any residents who may also be interested.

**The Queen's Green Canopy**: The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a unique tree planting initiative created to mark Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 which invites people from across the United Kingdom to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee." We are planning for Cleeve to be involved by planting a new tree on Pound Green.

The two trees we have secured under the Local Authority Treescapes Funding Scheme (via the Forestry Commission) will be a Hawthorn and a Liquid Amber. It is expected that these will be received and planted by the end of February.

**Dog Poo**!! Although most dog owners act responsibly there are still examples of instances of dog poo not always being picked up. Whilst this is, of course, anti-social it also is worth reminding dog owners that North Somerset Council have published local Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs).

The orders state that if you are in charge of a dog you must as a minimum:

- keep your dog(s) under close control at all times
- carry a poo bag
- bag it and bin it please don't leave bags hanging in trees or bushes
- keep your dog(s) out of children's play areas.

So how can we all do our bit to help turn things around?

• Help is at hand – in the form of a new free app called at https://poopersnooper.app/get-started

• Pooper Snooper lets you highlight the problem of dog fouling wherever you are and puts dog fouling on the map! The app also allows you to record and find the location of bins so that it's easier than ever to find where to dispose of your doggy deposits.

Communities can use this to highlight and monitor problematic areas and it is hoped that the data will better enable authorities to act, for example, by providing extra and/or better placed bins or by enabling the efforts of over-stretched dog wardens to be better targeted.

Keep Cleeve Tidy: Our Village Orderly, Caroline, does a great job in keeping the village litter free (although this is often an uphill task!). We would be interested to hear if there are any areas of the village which you feel need any special attention at any time. #### PLANT OF THE MONTH FEBRUARY - SNOWDROPS

Finally winter weather knocks the garden for six but nature provides hope. The first flower to rise like a phoenix from the cold ashes is the snowdrop. I don't think there is another bloom that brings so much optimism as snowdrops. Their pure white petals have come to symbolise purity and innocence but also symbathy as they were often found growing in cemeteries.

Galanthusnivalis meaning "milk flower of the snow" were brought to the UK by the Romans but had to wait till 1753 to be botanically names by Carl Linnaeus as part of the Amaryllidaceae family.

Snowdrops thrive in woodland conditions so try to recreate this feeling in your own garden with dappled shade. Plant January to March when the bulbs still have foliage, in the green; over time they will naturalise and spread.

Snowdrops are a genus of 20 species. These bulbous herbaceous perennials have three inner petals with green markings surronded by three outer petals, not to be confused with Acis or Leucojum, known as snowflakes. An exceptional snowdrop is Galanthus nivalist. pleniflorus Flore Pleno, whose delicate double flower heads are show shoppers.

Look out for snowdrops if out walking around North Somerset or Painswick Rococo Garden, Stroud and East Lambrook Manor, South Petherton are both stunning gardens to visit to see snowdrops en masse. Highly recommend a visit!
