

TIP FROM CLEEVE NURSERY

Prune winter flowering Jasmine and shrubby honeysuckle now. This will encourage new growth and give them time to initiate new flower buds for next year. Early flowering shrubs like Forsythia, Currants and flowering quince can be pruned back after flowering.

Compost heaps are great places for slow worms and occasionally grass snakes. Both are harmless and are gardener's friends as they eat many plant pests.

TIPS FROM CLEEVE NURSERY

Use horticultural fleece to protect tender shoots when frost is forecast. Plants that may be hit by spring frosts include Pieris, Japanese Maples, Camellias, Magnolias, Hydrangeas, bedding plants, lettuce, potatoes and beans.

Plant frost tender shrubs such as Lavender, Sage, Rosemary, Santolina, Osteospermum and Hebes now. They will be well established by autumn and overwinter so much better.

Trapping moles is the best way to get rid of this pest before it wrecks your lawn. Sonic deterrents will drive them away if used as directed.

Apply lawn dressing to even out bumps and hollows in your lawn





PLANT OF THE MONTH Monstera deliciosa, Swiss Cheese Plant

There was a time when people would groan when they saw a Swiss cheese plant or simply be indifferent, they were fairly common. I grew up with them being a fixture at art college, stashed in a corner of the studio, tied to a moss pole, ready to be pulled out for the class when we had to paint a still life. 'Not the Monstera again!' we'd cry.

But Monstera deliciosa's image has undergone a makeover. Its popularity has rocketed and now these jungle giants have become something of a commodity, commanding handsome price tags.

In China these dark green exotics are the symbol of long life and honouring elders. They symbolise good luck in Feng Shui and 'rays of hope' in Hawaii.

These evergreen vines have aerial roots, which hook onto trees in the wild for support, just as well as they can reach the heady heights of 20 metres, growing up towards the light in the rainforest canopies of southern Mexico and Panama.

Starting their life as epiphytes, Monstera gain moisture and nutrients from rainwater and the surrounding air via their aerial roots. As they grow some roots reach down to anchor in the soil for extra support, making Monstera hemiepiphytes, with both aerial and soil bound roots.

Their monstrous large leaves naturally develop holes, known as fenestration, as they mature. As well as ensuring tropical downpours can easily pass through the leaves without damaging them, it is theorised that this evolutionary adaption protects them from predators in the rainforest of Central America, cunningly disguising them as an ailing plant to be left well alone. Funny that these holes are exactly what make them so desirable to us humans.

Monstera deliciosa also produces a spectacular edible fruit. Although I haven't personally eaten it, it is supposed to taste of pineapple and banana. So the Latin name is rather apt – delicious monster!


COMMUNITY RESILIENCE



Dog Mess!

There has been an increase in owners allowing dogs to foul areas around the village. This has become a particular problem on Pound Green. There is absolutely no excuse for this so please make sure you clean up and bin any dog mess and, also, challenge any anti-social dog owners who fail to do so.

Nitrous oxide

Since 8 November 2023 nitrous oxide is now classified as a Class C drug under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971. It is a criminal offence to be found in possession of the drug where its intended use is to be wrongfully inhaled, 'to get high'.

Discarded canisters have been appearing for some time and, recently, a large aerosol type container and balloon were found on Pound Green.

BATS AND HEDGES

Last month we took a look at some interesting features of our local bat population – in particular the Greater and Lesser Horseshoe Bats that hibernate in the old iron mines in Kings Wood, and rear their young in the roost at Brockley Hall.

Horseshoe Bats can live to 30 years or more. Baby bats (pups) need to learn, from their mothers, all the routes from the bat roost to their foraging areas. Their preferred method of hunting is to perch in a tree and wait until they detect a flying beetle or moth. They then fly out to catch it before returning to their perch to eat it.

A group of researchers from the Bat Conservation Research Lab at UWE spent a recent summer in the fields within 3 miles of Kings Wood and Brockley Hall. They were interested in finding out the factors that affected where bats chose to hunt for food. The researchers used specialist ultrasonic detectors to detect where bats came to feed at night.

These detectors were placed along each side of hedges and each side of boundary fences. As bats use high-pitched calls to echo-locate their prey, the sounds recorded by the detectors were analysed to find out which bat species were present and to see how often each type of bat visited each location.

The main things they discovered were:-

- Bats much prefer hunt near hedges rather than near fences;
- Some types of bats like wide hedges, and some like high hedges;
- Some types of bats like mature trees in the hedge line;
- The Horseshoe Bats don't like to travel a long distance to hunt.

It's easy to see why the research's authors came up with the following advice:

"We recommend management strategies that give incentives to farmers for replacing fences with hedgerows, planting hedgerow trees, and maintaining tall and outgrown field boundaries."

If you'd like to read the full research paper, Google for "What drives bat activity at field boundaries?".*

Other research has shown that pesticide use has killed off a lot of the food sources for Horseshoe Bats, particularly beetles and moths.

So, for gardeners and landowners alike, there are ways to improve biodiversity and so improve our bats' chance of survival in this era of climate change. Replacing fences with hedges, growing your hedges wider and taller, and cutting out pesticide use are all beneficial. Oh, and since our bats are light-averse, don't leave outside lights on overnight.

To find out more, come to the Village Meeting on April 16th, which will be at the Village Hall. We are very lucky to have the enthusiastic bat expert, Alison Howell, come to talk to us about our bats. What she will tell us will be an eye-opener, I promise. All welcome!

TIPS FROM CLEEVE NURSERY

Plant containers up with some herbs. Avoid planting mint with other herbs as it will take over given a chance. Coriander, parsley, thyme, chives and tarragon are some of the most popular and look very decorative too! Keep them by the backdoor for easy access.

Don't stop feeding birds now that spring is here, now they have young they are under greatest pressure and will really benefit from your help.

Check blackcurrants for reversion virus. If affected, bushes will not crop. Infected plants produce flowers that are redder [no hairs] and leaves that have less points on the margins and of course no fruit on the branches. Dig out and burn infected plants and plant new ones.
