


COMMUNITY RESILIENCE

Parking issues in Cleeve: It seems that the issues around parking continue to present a challenge and it would be very helpful if, in the first instance, any illegal parking is reported: https://forms.n-somerset.gov.uk/ad/form/parkingillegally#/1

It is important to remember that, under the Road Traffic Act 1991, parking was decriminalised and civil enforcement of car parking regulations, is now carried out by civil enforcement officers operating on behalf of North Somerset Council rather than by the Police.

CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) Monies: The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a new way of collecting financial contributions from developments towards the provision of infrastructure required to support growth in North Somerset. It has been in place since January 2018 and North Somerset Council CIL charges are based on a tariff of rates that have been set through public consultation and examination by the Planning Inspectorate.

Town and Parish Councils in North Somerset will receive a proportion of the CIL funds collected from developments in their Town or Parish.

In Cleeve we have received a payment relating to the re-development of the former Lord Nelson site.

The CIL Regulations state that a Town/Parish Council must use CIL receipts passed to it in accordance with Regulation 59A or 59B to support the development of the local council's area, or any part of that area, by funding:

(a) the provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or

(b) anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area.

Cleeve Parish Council are consulting the community on any ideas they may have for projects. The ideas must be

a) For the benefit of the community.

b) No major infrastructure projects.

c) Projects up to a value of £5,000.

We will also publish this request on our Facebook page and be available to discuss at parish "surgeries" when these re-commence. We will also review any issues which may arise once the new development is operational in Spring 2022.

Air Quality Monitoring: In liaison with North Somerset Council we have arranged to undertake Air Quality Monitoring particularly on the A370 in the area around the Lord Nelson/Tout's development. This is now in place and will give us a reference point ahead of the site being operational.

Allotments: Many years ago there were a small number of allotments available in Cleeve. We have had an email from a local resident expressing interest in taking an allotment on. This is likely to be a lengthy process to investigate viability, but we would be like to hear from any residents who may also be interested.

Dog Poo!! Although most dog owners act responsibly there are still examples of instances of dog poo not always being picked up. Whilst this is, of course, anti-social it also is worth reminding dog owners that North Somerset Council have published local Public Space Protection Orders (PSPOs).

The orders state that if you are in charge of a dog you must as a minimum:

- keep your dog(s) under close control at all times
- carry a poo bag
- bag it and bin it please don't leave bags hanging in trees or bushes
- keep your dog(s) out of children's play areas.

So how can we all do our bit to help turn things around?

 Help is at hand – in the form of a new free app called https://poopersnooper.app/ get-started

• Pooper Snooper lets you highlight the problem of dog fouling wherever you are and puts dog fouling on the map! The app also allows you to record and find the location of bins so that it's easier than ever to find where to dispose of your doggy deposits.

• Communities can use this to highlight and monitor problematic areas and it is hoped that the data will better enable authorities to act, for example, by providing extra and/or better placed bins or by enabling the efforts of over-stretched dog wardens to be better targeted.

Keep Cleeve Tidy: Our Village Orderly, Caroline, does a great job in keeping the village litter free (although this is often an uphill task!). We would be interested to hear if there are any areas of the village which you feel need any special attention at any time. ON OUR FARMS

This is the time of year when farmers start silage making. Silage is grass that has been mowed, dried, made into a big heap in a silage clamp and then sealed with polythene to preserve it. The polythene sheet acts as a barrier to stop air from having contact with the grass. It forms an environment where the grass is pickled and without contact with the air stabilises and maintains its nutrient value until the following winter ready for feeding. Not only does this require the skill of the farmer but a helping hand from the weather. Mowing is best done when the sun has warmed the grass a little and helped the sugar level increase. Turning and raking is best done after the grass has had the sun shine on it for twenty four hours or so. And, for perfection, a little breeze helps the grass dry. Once this has happened it is down to the farmer to chop the grass into small pieces using a forage harvester before hauling it to the silage clamp for ensiling. With the rocketing prices of fertilizer and animal feed this year, it is doubly important the grass is converted into silage the best it possibly can to reduce the need for purchased feed in the winter 2022 - 2023. This might mean a case of smaller harvests of grass but more of them from now until September. This is all very well for increasing the nutrient levels in the silage but means more fuel to make it. There is a balancing act with this. What is the most economic? Less fuel and slightly lower quality silage or use more fuel and get the best possible quality silage? Aside from this decision, farmers will be making the best possible use of their farm manures and slurry rather than purchase man made fertiliser. This might mean some manure being spread closer to the villages than it normally would be but it is in a good cause. Not only will it reduce the cost of production it will reduce the amount of fertiliser required to. A win win win for the farmer, consumer and the environment.

This time of year also heralds the start of the agricultural show season. The North Somerset Agricultural Society's annual show is the first in a long line of UK shows held each year. After a two year Covid break it is being held at the Society's showground near Wraxall on Monday 2nd May. There is something for everyone at the show. Lots of livestock in competition to see which ones are the best, main ring attractions, plenty of trade stands for those who want to go shopping, showjumping, tractor pulling and many other rural events. It's a great day out and right on our doorstep. For further information you can visit <u>www.nsas.org.uk</u> For many, the North Somerset Show is the start of summer. Let's hope it's a good one and the trials and tribulations of the last two years of Covid dims into the past.

NAILSEA DISTRICT LEG CLUB

This is a community initiative to support anyone with lower legs issues; leg ulcers plus varicose veins, leg pain, skin problems and rashes, etc. Holistic treatment and a thorough review of leg concerns is given by nurses who are employed either by Tyntesfield Medical Group or Sirona, and the NHS provides dressings. A team of volunteers provides refreshments, social interaction and befriending to those who may be isolated at home due to these problems.

The drop-in clinic takes place on a Wednesday morning at Nailsea Tithe Barn. Holding it in a community setting rather than on medical premises or in the patient's home empowers members to participate in their care, in a social environment that eases loneliness by providing congenial surroundings where old friends can meet and new friendships formed. Although nurses and dressings are funded, rent has to be paid for the use of the Tithe Barn, plus the equipment bought and other incidentals such as refreshments, driver reimbursement and stationary paid for. We therefore have to rely on fundraising across the year, and some member donations and grants.

Please note the clinic is only available to patients registered with Tyntesfield Medical Group, and you may be encouraged to attend by your GP, Practice or District Nurse or you may have already heard of us. Providing you are registered at Tyntesfield Medical Group all are welcome, including carers and family members. Should you have difficulty getting to the Leg Club, we may be able to refer you to our volunteer transport scheme. Inevitably the clinic closed due to the pandemic and sadly nurses haven't been able to return yet due to pressure of their normal work load. However volunteers have started running a social café at Nailsea Tithe Barn on Wednesday mornings 10.30 -12 noon to enable everyone to meet up again and all those enduring these problems are welcome. It has proved to be very popular and there's always a happy, welcoming and sociable atmosphere

PLANT OF THE MONTH - PRIMULA AURICULA

Mountain cowslip or bear's ear might not sound familiar but if you say auricula, most plants people will be smiling. These delightful colourful primulas are a collector's dream. Whether you favour striped, border, double, edged, self or fancy, auricula do not fail to impress.

Look out for auricula specialists W&S Lockyer. The family nursery continues to be run by Simon and partner Louise after the passing of founder Bill Lockyer in 2016. The tradition of wearing Bill's trademark bowler hat continues. Displaying copper kettles is a nod to hthe 1830s; copper kettles were used to mark auricula flower shows and a 'best in show' prizes. With over 20 years of exhibiting and numerous Gold medals won, W&S Lockyer really has earned expert status.

Auricula first made an appearance in European gardens mid 16th century but became collectable in the 17th, 18th and 19th centuries.

Auriculas shy away from hot sun and drenching rain so are perfect for a shady garden spot with plenty of ventilation. Don't let their delicate form and exquisite colours fool you, originating from the European alps these alpines are tough little plants. Dormant over winter they launch into life for spring. Terracotta pots are ideal containers as they absorb water, drain and keep roots cool. Do not top dress with grit; let water evaporate naturally.

Shade is very important and that is one reason why auricula theatres became such a fahionable way to display them. Theatres are tiered display cabinets, often wooden with pots arranged vertically. Repot each year to refresh soil - just keep a look out for wine weevil!

Warning! Growing auricula can be addictive!
