Western Forest: We have been contacted by Avon Wildlife Trust regarding the creation of the Wester Forest. They are offering advice, support and funding options to farmers, land-owning businesses, community groups and local councils who are interested in planting trees on their land.

Free advice and support on offer:

OPERATION STARFISH – PART 3 HOW THE STARFISH SYSTEM WORKED.

All deception relies on human nature and confirmation bias – you see what you are expecting to see. Leaving aside the many different schemes and methods of deceiving German bomb aimers, the most spectacular was the ‘Special Fire’ – this became known as SF and then ‘Starfish’. There was usually a ring of sites around a city or target. The concept was simple and relied on human nature.

Most German air raids had two components, pathfinders to locate the target and a main force to deliver the bombs. Pathfinders carried expert navigators and radio location systems to find the target and bomb it with incendiaries, phosphorous and oil bombs to start fires. These together with flares acted as a marker for the less experienced main force who arrived after the fires had become established.

Turner reasoned that if the initial fires could be extinguished quickly before the main bomber force arrived, less experienced crews using maps and eyesight to locate the aiming point could perhaps be led astray by a realistic decoy fire near to, but clear of, the genuine target. There were always bombs that fell outside the designated area, so even if some of the genuine fires were still burning, a spectacular show might be mistaken for the real thing, leaving the actual target untouched or at least with less damage.

Decoy fire sites all over the country were on continuous standby and ready to light as the destination of the bombers was only known a few hours before take off and sometimes only once bombing began. Important targets were provided with a ring of decoys so that there was one for any likely direction of approach. Once the raid began, the ‘special fire’ decoy on that side would be ignited to look as if the City below was alight.

Col. Turner obliged by providing a burning target that appeared just a little sooner than the real one, but from the air looked genuine. From an aircraft at night it is difficult to judge size, and there was no way to tell how big a fire was as that depended on the success of the pathfinders, thus if an apparently realistic fire could be seen in the expected location, most bomb aimers would aim at the decoy rather than continue searching for the real, blacked out target. Particularly if there was anti aircraft fire and the threat of fighters, the natural instinct was to bomb and get out fast. It was essential that the decoys existence and location were unknown to the Germans because once it was, it could be used as a navigation beacon for the real target, hence the very high level of secrecy.

To further improve the realism, the film engineers developed some superbly spectacular special effects to make the ‘target’ seem genuine. This was a critical part of the deception and superb lateral thinking. Any one aircraft was only overhead for a few minutes, thus the special effects could repeat at short intervals without giving the game away. To bomb aimers it looked as if they were over the burning target with collapsing buildings, explosions, ruptured oil tanks and huge fires. The fact that everything repeated on a continuous cycle was irrelevant as they only saw it once and with luck dropped their bombs on the open land of the decoy and not on civilians and towns! It is generally estimated that around 20% of all German bombs dropped on the UK were decoyed and thus wasted.

When it worked it was an excellent way of deflecting bombs. There are no known cases of a 100% success but there were some where the great majority of munitions hit a decoy, these including a raid on Bristol and another on Portsmouth. Even a small percentage of bombs wasted saved lives and damage and any that hit the decoy were considered a success. Turner was very careful not to overestimate his results and the official statistics are generally believed to greatly undervalue the effect of the decoy system.

An important subsidiary benefit was that a working decoy caused mayhem for navigators and the German beam navigation system as there was now a discrepancy between the electronics and maps and what the aircrews thought they were seeing on the ground below. The result was that many became lost on the way home as they based their navigation on the location of target they had bombed and this in turn caused a loss of confidence in their new electronic direction aids with returning bombers scattered all over Northern France.

When it didn't work, it was useless. One raid on Bristol was getting a very good result when a stray bomb hit a gasometer in the centre of the City which blew up and completely exposed the real target! It was a matter of luck, but the decoys improved the chances of diverting at least some of the bombs if they could remain secret.

YOGA IN CLEEVE

Gina Ryall has lived locally for over 30 years working for much of this time as a physiotherapist. During most of this time she suffered with low back pain until, a few years ago, she decided enough was enough and she gave up work. This had the benefit of freeing up some time and she was able to re-take up yoga. She found it so beneficial, physically and mentally that she trained as a yoga teacher with the British Wheel of Yoga. For the last few years she has been teaching classes in Cleeve and Claverham Village Halls.

Yoga has a long history. It originated in India about 5000 years ago associated with meditation and the search for enlightenment. Its use in Western Europe is much more recent surging considerably during the 1960s as a mental and physical discipline. Gina mostly teaches Hatha Yoga which seeks to improve physical and mental well-being with attention to exercise, breathing and mindfulness. However, she is about to start a new class on Thursdays in Cleeve Village Hall from 9:30 to 11:00 for a deeper dive into asana practice (poses), pranayama (breathwork) and relaxation.

Yoga has contributed greatly to the improvement in Gina's back condition and she has helped many others on the way. Her regular classes are in Cleeve Village Hall on Mondays 09.30 -10.30 and Fridays 12.30 - 1.30 with typically around 8 -12 people in each class. Some people have attended for a long time and for whom yoga is a way of life; others use yoga to help with injuries. The group is friendly and welcoming to beginners and those who are more experienced. Open to anyone of 18 years and above from Cleeve and local villages. All you need is a mat!

BOYS DID GOOD!



THE OLD SCHOOL - PLUNDER STREET ENTRY FROM 1995

BUILDINGS The school building has withstood one hundred and thirty four years of children and the ravages of time, and even now it looks good enough to last another hundred years. Perhaps this is upon the builders but also on its good maintenance. For the first fifteen years after its opening no caretaker was employed at the school, from the records it shows that on the 10th February 1886, "Rev I.G. Alford visited.... and the old rule of the children sweeping the school in turn was publicly rescinded". This entry was followed on the 14th February by "A woman was appointed to do all the necessary cleaning work of the school". This was the first in a long line of school caretakers. 1903 was an eventful year for the fabric of the school, for in June of that year the school bell was repaired. It is thought that the bell was actually replaced at this time, the bell was finally removed in 1966 when the bell tower was considered unsafe. Also in 1903 the cesspit started to cause problems which increased with the passing years, particularly at emptying times. It wasn't until 1965 that agreement was reached with contractors to empty the cesspit only out of school hours. Then in 1967 the school was joined to the main Old scho drainage system. The toilets originally must have been primitive, in 1908 an Inspector commented that some simple apparatus for lavatory purposes should be supplied. The school did not have a mains water supply when it was first opened, it wasn't until 1908 when pipes were laid to the school house. The school continued to make do with a pump from a well in the girls playground until 1912 when taps were placed in each yard for drinking and cleansing purposes. Electricity came to the school in 1930 and this must have brought a vast improvement to the lighting of the classrooms. Imagine a school without electricity today !!! The playground was opened in 1958 using land rented from Lord Sinclair for a peppercorn rent of 1/- (5p) per year. Before the playground was established, the children played in the courtyards adjacent to the school or in the quarry opposite the school.

NOTE FROM PRESENT TREASURER - imagine allowing Children to play in the old Quarry nowadays with Health and Safety Risk assessments!

PUMPKIN PIE - W.I. RECIPE 1995

6 oz Shortcrust Pastry	½ Pint Pumpkin Pulp	2 Eggs
3 oz Sugar	1 tsp Cinnamon	½ pt Milk
½ Lemon		

Method:

Remove skin and seeds from the pumpkin, cut into thick slices. stew gently with very little water until tender then strain and rub through a sieve.

Line a deep pie plate with short crust pastry and brush over with egg white.

Mix the pumpkin puree with the beaten eggs, cinnamon, sugar, milk and the grated rind and juice of ½ a lemon. turn into the lined pie plate and bake for about 40 minutes. The first 10 mins at 450°F/Gas Mark 7. Then reduce to 325°F Gas Mark 2. Serve hot or cold.

A TALE OF MANY RESTAURANTS!

In April's edition Alfresco Restaurant was highlighted, so I hope readers will now be interested in the complete history of their site, compiled with the help of Newspaper Archives.

The A370 road widening and improvements in the 1920s resulted in the current site's creation: with the new road one side and the old road the other side. Mr. Mortimore purchased this site and built an all-wood garage and chalet type bungalow; soon after the road works were completed, the Western Daily Press in January 1925 advertised "*A H Mortimore Cleeve Fill Station Garage has a 1922, 4 wheeled Coventry Premier car for sale at the price of £75*"

Not known exactly, when but Mr. Sid Coward, and his brother in-law Owen Light, took over the house, garage and premises around 1939; Mr. Light and family lived in the Chalet type bungalow and built an octagonal cafe (and Tea Gardens) run by his wife and daughter until the ?1950s? and thought to have been named "Oaklands Café". Mr. Coward and Owen Light continued with the garage until 1964 when Mr. Collins purchased the whole site.

Previous to that sale and within living memory: the site's Bristol end was no more than scrubland and a copse, with large trees growing, whilst the Weston-Super-Mare end was used to store the GPO's Telegraph Poles; when Village children played on these poles on a hot summers day, the poles' tar caused much cleaning of person and clothes!

Mr. Collins demolished all the wooden structures, that had been there since 1925, building a new house, restaurant and garage; the Western Daily Press in February 15th 1966 reported the new garage would be opening shortly and that the new restaurant "Golden Acres" was due to be opened in May. A very good restaurant which consequently was a great success.

Sadly, in 1971, Mr. Collins, being on the verge of Bankruptcy, was revealed to have originally bought the property with a Loan from The Esso Petroleum Company. In 1968, he sold the Filling Station and Garage to Amoco which enabled his debt to Esso to be satisfied.

Around about 1972, Mr. Collins sold the restaurant and house to another purchaser who renamed the business "Abbas Diner".

Amoco, which had taken over the running of the garage, leased that to various tenants until the filling station closed in the late 1990s and the site was then used for Private Car Sales.

Abbas Diner, a very good Steak House, continued to prosper until the owner sold up 1986 when it then was renamed "Theo's" which only lasted a short time; in 1988 "CJ's" arrived, it did not last long, as in December 1989, it became the Chinese Restaurant "Kings Palace" which was renamed in February 1990 "China Palace" and ran for a good many years until being transformed to an Indian restaurant "Bombay Palace" which, as we know from the last article in April's edition, then became Alfresco!!
